Founded in 1970, Douglas College is the largest degreegranting college in British Columbia, Canada, educating close to 24,000 students per year.

The College has two major campuses in Metro Vancouver (New Westminster and Coquitlam) as well as several smaller training centres and the Anvil Tower.

Douglas College's student body is characterized by great diversity, with students from 92 countries. Most Douglas College students are enrolled in 2-year programs and will eventually transfer to a local University to continue their studies. Some students are enrolled in Bachelors programs.

Study English at Douglas College, a leader in English as a Second Language (ESL) education for university and college students in Metro Vancouver.



Eligibility

Students must:

- maintain the equivalent of a 2.5 grade-point-average (GPA)
- demonstrate proficiency in English*
 - o TOEFL 45
 - o IELTS 4.5

In some cases students may be able to do ELLA courses for the 1st semester and academic courses in the 2nd semester.

Exchange students have many choices for accommodation. Most students choose to rent a room in a shared apartment or house, or rent a suite-apartment. Douglas College does not have on-campus housing. It recommended students rent a furnished apartment.

Some students prefer to immerse themselves in Canadian culture by living with a local family. This arrangement is known as a homestay. Homestays can include meals or not, depending on students' preferences.

More practical information

Visas

Exchange students coming for 6 months or less

- A study permit is <u>not</u> required
- Students will need to obtain an Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA) or a Visitor (Temporary Resident) Visa, depending on their nationality.
- Click <u>here</u> to find out if an eTA or Vistor Visa is required.

Exchange students coming for <u>6 months or more</u>

- Students are required to hold a valid <u>study permit</u> during their study in Canada.
- First, apply for a study permit and prepare to arrive
- Some student from certain <u>countries</u> must also apply for a <u>Temporary Resident Visa (TRV)</u>
- Be sure you are aware of the Conditions of your Study Permit
- Note that <u>eTA registration</u> is required for students from entry visa-exempt countries (except for U.S. citizens) when entering Canada by air
- Students should apply for their study permit as soon as they have been accepted





More practical information

Insurance (all students)

All incoming exchange students must have sufficient medical insurance coverage. It is their responsibility to purchase their own insurance coverage before their travel to Canada. Students staying for the academic year will be required to enroll in the government insurance plan BC MSP.

<u>Insurance for students studying for more than 6 months</u>

Students who will stay for more than 1 semester must register for the government health plan (MSP) in addition to their private insurance. MSP costs CAD \$75 per month. More information can be found here <u>Apply for MSP - Province of British Columbia</u>. It is recommended students apply as soon as they arrive.
